

EQUIPMENT

what do I need?

Centershot® offers membership discounts on NASP® approved equipment.



BOWS

Centershot® uses the Genesis®Original, the Genesis® Mini or the GEN-X® bow depending on league type. They have a universal draw length that makes it equal and fair for every archer.



ARROWS

Centershot® uses the Easton 1820 full length aluminum arrow. They come in different colored shafts, fletching and nock colors to help distinguish an archer's score. These arrows are approved for NASP competition.



TARGETS

Centershot® uses 80 cm FITA (Federation of International Target Archery) Bullseye Targets or IBO® (International Bowhunting Organization) 3D Foam targets. Other targets available depending on league type.



BACKSTOP NET

A specific designed arrow curtain approximately 30 feet long and 8-10 feet high is used to safely stop arrows that miss the target.



FLOOR ARROW QUIVERS

A vertical tube about 15 inches tall and 2-4 inches in diameter with a secure base to hold arrows at the shooting line. Every archer must have their own quiver on the shooting line.



BOW RACKS

Safely rack the bows between the waiting line and the shooting line.



REPAIR & MAINTENANCE KIT

Arrow fletching and nocks can be repaired quickly. Bow maintenance will ensure decades of safe use.



The Journey of Sharing!!

Welcome again to Archery Ministries! We hope and pray that these next few weeks will once again be a rewarding experience for you. You may be wondering how archery and church go together. Well, hang on because the journey continues once you have accepted Jesus Christ as your personal Savior and are striving to live out your life in discipleship.

The study you are about to begin is called *Share the Plan: This Is My Story*. What does that mean? Hopefully through this study you will understand that God loves you and has a plan for how you should be a witness for Him and share your story of God's love to everyone and know what it means to share that love. During this study, you'll use *The Share the Plan Poem* which was written to help you understand what the next step is once you have made a decision to follow Christ and you are striving to be His Disciple and being good stewards. Basically, the lessons in this study will help you understand how we should live our lives in Christ and share our story in all aspects of our everyday living. And, as if that wasn't cool enough, we're going to learn more about archery in the process!

So listen up! We're all going to learn something new in the next few weeks.

Share the Plan is divided into eight sections, or Arrow Points, that will take you beyond the basics of shooting a bow and arrow to a more in-depth critique of your shooting form and performance. Some of you may have been shooting for a long time and see no need for any help. Everyone will benefit from this course because critical practice is a tremendous help for everyone. We hope that you will take this important step seriously. While archery is very important to this study (and there's going to be a lot of shooting!), this handbook was created to help you focus on the many spiritual ways to continue your journey with Christ. Don't worry we know none of us like homework! Because of that, the lessons are developed to be concise and to the point without missing the focus! Each study should take you about 45 minutes. However, we encourage you to study further and be in prayer about what God has in store for you!

Finally, we wish you blessings on your journey and will be praying for your success as you undertake this program. We thank God for your effort and hope that you will find success in archery and, most importantly, that this study will help you to make Christ the Story of your life!

1 First Arrow Point

Leader Suggestions:

Theme: "This Is My Story"

Introduction:

- 1. As you begin this new series of lessons share the process of the Centershot studies.
 2. We began with God's Plan of salvation and moved then to the area of discipleship in order for us to know God's plan of ministry and mission.
- 3. We studied how to live the plan by observing the stewardship of our lives.
- 4. Now we are going to study how to share the plan as we are challenged to give witness to our story of faith.
- 5. Prayer: As the leader opens with prayer. You may choose to pray or lead in the Lord's Prayer that is printed at the end of the lesson. If you use the Lord's Prayer at this point be prepared to pray yourself at the conclusion of the lesson.

You Can't Come Back from Where You Ain't Been!

There is an old Appalachian mountain saying that carries the title of this lesson, "You can't come back from where you ain't been". In other words, you cannot share what you have not experienced. Jesus shared with His disciples in Luke's account of The Acts of the Apostles, "...you will receive power to be my witnesses in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria and to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8). God has a plan for the salvation of the world and those who are Christ Followers are given the privilege and opportunity to share what, where, why and how they have experienced God's love and grace in their lives. All who follow Christ have a life story to share!

What is your life story? In Luke's Gospel, chapter 15, there are three stories of what God is like. The third story is about a family. They are all prodigals in their own right (Prodigal means extravagant). Let's hear this story: A father has two sons! The youngest one is a rebel and plots a way to leave the farm his father and brother and seek the fun and adventure of the world. However, he is broke! The younger son is smart enough to know that to do what he wants to do will cost a fortune. His plan is to approach his father with the idea that he deserves his inheritance now while he can enjoy it and not have to wait until the father dies. The father in showing love, agrees. The young lad in his joy takes the money and heads out of town and right into the arms of those who would love to spend his money for him. There were lavish parties, drunken nights, and outlandish purchases to keep all of those around him happy and close by his side. However, there is a price to be paid for that kind of living and before too long the young spender is broke, friendless, and hungry.

First Arrow Point

Know the Word

Read Acts 1:8
What does this Scripture mean to you?

What do you do when you are desperate? The young fellow decided on working yet the only job he could find was feeding the swine; a young Jewish boy feeding the pigs? What a picture! He realized that he was so hungry that he would even eat the slop he was feeding the pigs. In his state of crushed dreams and loneliness the young man comes to his senses. He remembers the lavish table that was set at every meal back home. He remembers a prosperous father and an older brother that he really did love. His mind takes him back to the servants his father had on the farm and knew that they were far better off than he was. In that moment of enlightenment he decided to return home with a prepared speech for his father. He memorized it! "Dad, I have messed up! Everything that I wanted is gone. I know what it is to lose everything. I know that I have been selfish and it is nobody's fault but mine. Could you be so kind as to let me come back as one of your servants? I'll gladly take the bunk house and whatever the servant's life would be." And so he sets out for home!

Meanwhile back at the farm his father has spent some sleepless nights and the big brother has dreamed that his faithfulness to his father would be rewarded with the pleasure of his father's life style after the father's death. The father has sat daily on the front porch of the home place watching with anticipation and hope that his young son would return. Days had turned into weeks and weeks into months and now even years had passed with an empty vision of his son's return. But he lived with hope! Daily he waited and longed for his son's return. His wait was rewarded because one day he saw the figure of a man coming up the lane and he recognized the walk even though it was labored. It was his son coming home! The son's eyes fastened upon the house ahead, as he rehearsed his speech, but the father was running with open arms down the lane to hug his son and welcome him home. As they got closer and closer to each other the tears were running down dad's face and the son was mumbling over and over his prepared speech yet in the moment all you could hear was dad's cries. "Your home, your home, welcome back, welcome back! I have longed for this day. Here are some new clothes, a new family ring, it's party time! We will celebrate your return!"

First Arrow Point

Leader Suggestions:

- 1. This is a time for tremendous insight into each person. It is a time to help each person to become more comfortable in giving witness to their story. It should be emphasized that each participant cannot get this wrong. This is giving witness to your story and there is nothing wrong about your story.
- 2. Let me make two suggestions for processing this lesson.
- a) Make sure each student has a pencil or pen. Have them draw their dining room table or living area and place their family around it or in it in the space provided in their lesson manual.
- b) After concluding, each person will join in a circle and share one at a time what they want the group to know about themselves and their family. They can begin by saying "I am this is my story...." As the leader you begin the sharing. If the group is over 12 people break it up into another group or have them just share specific things about themselves and their family. What is important in this exercise is having each person give witness to their story. This can be a bonding time as you begin this journey. It will be extremely important that the group honor each person's story by being attentive.
- 3. You can make a list of the things that you want each participant to share, i.e., name, address, parents, siblings, interests, hobbies, what they like about Centershot, etc. After a brief time you can join everyone into a circle and begin giving witness to the stories. As a leader you begin.
- 4. At the conclusion of this circle time of sharing please thank everyone for the gift of their life story.

To the young son's surprise he was welcomed home not as a servant but restored to his place in the family. To the older son's surprise his brother was welcomed home not as a servant but restored to his place in the family. All of us have a story that we can give witness to and the older son is no different. The servants are running around with great joy getting ready for a party when the eldest returns from the fields. He has faithfully taken over all the responsibilities since his brother took off and his father took up residence on the front porch waiting. To be honest the eldest had been waiting for a party, but it was for him a funeral celebration. He knew that this farm would belong to him when dad was gone. Now! Now? What would happen? He did not have a prepared speech; he only had a reactionary outburst. His loud voice told the story. He was mad! And his anger would not be short lived because of his brother's coming home party. He had been faithful and now faithfulness was bringing no reward. It was a bad day in his eyes. As a side note to this story, it was a really, really, really bad day for the fat calf!

Every person has a story. I can try to interpret what it was like for these three Biblical characters, but I cannot give witness to what it was like to walk in their shoes. I can only give witness to what I know and what I have seen and experienced. You and I can't come back from where we ain't been! You cannot tell my story and I cannot tell your story!

What is your life story? I would like to know you better as we become friends and make this Centershot journey together. Would you be willing to give witness to your story? I want to share mine with you.....

1st Arrow Prayer:

Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses and we forgive those who trespass against us. Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil: for Thine is the Kingdom, and the power, and the glory forever. Amen."

In Conclusion:

This Biblical witness of a particular family is one of the characteristics of many parables with which Jesus used to teach. The parable is about what many call the Prodigal son, however; perhaps the most extravagant or prodigal in this parable is the father.



The father waits daily for the son's return and when it happens the father baths the son with grace, forgiveness, love and acceptance. The father proclaims that his "son was lost, but is now found" and they prepare for a celebration of the sons return. What is God like? This is an awesome picture of God's waiting for our return home. When we have gone our way and have chosen to live without a relationship with God, God awaits our coming back. We can return to God's open and waiting arms of grace any time any place. That is the "Good News" to which we can personally give witness once we have experienced it. Remember, "you can't come back from where you ain't been".

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Leader Suggestions:

1. Conclude your time together with circle prayer. If you sense that people do not know the Lord's Prayer than this would be a teaching moment. 2. Use the Lord's prayer that is printed in the lesson manual or you may spend this time in gratitude to God for the session that everyone has experienced and for each story that was shared.

It's Personal

Leader Suggestions:

- 1. As you begin today take time to review last week's lesson. As you prepare to pray thank each participant for their courage in telling their story and begin by praying together the Lord's Prayer (It is printed in the lesson Manual).
- 2. As you prepare for this lesson it would be good to review some or all of the following Biblical stories and choose one of them to share in its context. It would be great to develop props or have the students participate in the story. You may choose to diminish some of the blood. guts and gore of the stories and emphasize the underlying meaning of these events in salvation history.

We all like heroes or heroines. When I was a boy it was superman and superwoman, the Lone Ranger and Sky King. My children loved Ninja Turtles and Star Wars. Do you follow super heroes or do you have someone that you look up to in your life? Biblically we remember David's triumphant victory over the giant Goliath, Moses' leading the Israelites out of slavery and bondage. There was Caleb and Joshua scouting out the Promised Land. What a great adventure of faith they had. There was Gideon being victorious over the Philistines with 300 men carrying pitchers, lamps, and trumpets. Whoever heard of fighting a battle with such weapons? These are just a few of the many heroic figures of the Bible that give us inspiration in various ways as we live our lives every day. Can a doubter be a hero?

After God resurrected Jesus from the dead, Jesus appeared to his disciples on several occasions. On His first appearance to them one of the disciples was missing, Thomas. When Thomas heard of his friend's witness of seeing Jesus, Thomas doubted their testimony. Thomas declared that he would not believe without proof. "Unless I see the nail holes in his hands, put my finger in the nail holes, and stick my hand in his side, I won't believe it." (John 20: 25 The Message) A week later when the disciples are gathered together again and Thomas is present, Jesus appears to them. The proof is standing before Thomas and humbly he declares that Jesus is his Lord. Thomas becomes our hero! Thomas informs us that we can have doubts, questions, and problems with Jesus' life, death, and resurrection and still be a Christ Follower.

My relationship with Jesus Christ is an adventure of hope, love, doubt, joy, questions, affirmations, pondering, and faith. Peter is another hero for us because he enables us to see that we can have great faith and great failures and still live a faithful life. Many people have shared with me over my years of being a Christ Follower that their relationship with Jesus is personal. How true it is! My walk with Christ is personal! The Bible declares just how personal it is. John, records in chapter 20, verse 31 that he has written his gospel so that we might believe that Jesus is the Christ and believing in Him we might have life in His name; that sounds personal to me. When I decided to follow Christ it was my choice for my life.



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Being personal however does not mean there are not questions to ask and doubts to face. It is important that we know why we believe that Jesus is the Christ. It is important that we face the issues of proof that we need to journey with Christ. When friends and family, acquaintances and strangers cast disparaging remarks our way how do we respond? What does it do to our faith? Write your thoughts to this question in the box below.



So let us journey down the road of questions, doubts and faith so that we might know why we believe what we believe about this Jesus. This is an important journey in giving witness to our story!

It's the personal part of our faith journey.



Leader Suggestions:

- 1. The following questions are important for the students to answer because it enables them to better know what they believe and why. In our world they will face the questions and doubts of faith and should be prepared for those situations as they experience them.
- 2. The size of your group will be the determination of how these questions can be shared. Please make sure that everyone has an opportunity to express their answers and question derived from this inquiry. We would suggest that time be given for them to work personally on answering the questions and then report back to the total group. Again you can gain great insight into their faith journey or the lack there of during this lesson and this time can lead you to pursue particular areas of faith for clarification. Also, you being vulnerable enough to share some of your faith struggles will be important in the group dynamics.

In light of what we've discussed, what does it mean to be courageous and admit and search, like Thomas, for answers to our questions about our faith journey?

In Conclusion:

Thomas the doubter, Peter the denier, and the other disciples who were cowards during a time when Jesus needed them most are all examples of people who have failed yet took advantage of the opportunity to be renewed in faith and continue their journey. Our faith is personal. We should always study and share with others our journey so that we know why we believe what we believe about this Jesus.

As Christ's Followers we conclude our time together with a question in preparation for next week, since our faith in Christ is personal, does that mean that it is private? Make it a great week!



Leader Suggestions:

- 1. In your concluding remarks please make it known to your students that any struggles, questions, or doubts that they experience can be shared with you, a pastor, youth leader, church school teacher, etc., so that they can be assured that they do not have to face those times alone. Making each of them aware that it is normal to have these kinds of struggles in their faith life is extremely important. The courageous ones are the ones who will admit and search. like Thomas, for the answers.
- 2. Conclude your time together with circle prayer. If you sense that people do not know the Lord's Prayer than this would be a teaching moment.
- 3. Use the Lord's prayer that is printed in the lesson manual or you may spend this time in gratitude to God for the session that everyone has experienced.

A Penny for Your Thoughts


Leader Suggestions:

- 1. Preparation for this lesson will take securing 10 pennies for each student and yourself.
- 2. As you begin today, take time to review last week's lesson. As you prepare to pray, thank each participant for their willingness to join in the discussion and share their doubts, questions, and affirmations.
- 3. It is important that the students learn that it is in everyday situations and with people that they know that sharing their faith story begins. One person sharing with another what they believe is great news for their own life.

Could one single cent mean an eternal difference in someone's life? Let's see! Andrew was a fisherman that had an older dominant brother named Simon. Andrew was quiet, reserved, but open to new thoughts and possibilities. He had lived his religious life searching for the Messiah. In John's Gospel Andrew is mentioned on three occasions. Each time, John characterizes Andrew as someone who is bringing people to Jesus. After Andrew first heard Jesus speak and spent an afternoon with Him, Andrew went quickly to get his brother Simon Peter. He greeted Simon with these words, "We have found the Messiah" (John 1:40-42, The Message). And with those words Andrew took his brother to meet Jesus. It was on a Galilean hillside where Jesus had been teaching the multitude when Jesus challenged the disciples with the task of feeding the 5,000 plus people who had gathered. It was again Andrew who brought a young lad to Jesus who disclosed that what he had he would share; five (5) barley loaves of bread and two (2) fish. Could this young lad's lunch be dinner for everyone? Without Andrew bringing him to Jesus we would never know that little is much in the hands of the Christ.

Have you ever brought anyone to Jesus? Have you ever invited anyone to come with you to Church? Let's see if we can identify ways to discover people who need Christ and the Church! Let's begin where we are:

How did you get to Centershot? Did you see a registration form laying somewhere; hear about it from a friend at school? Did your parents read about it or did they talk with a friend who gave them a registration form? How did you arrive here?

Why would Simon go immediately with Andrew to see a stranger? Because of trust! Simon knew Andrew of course, he was his brother. But Simon knew something else about Andrew; Andrew could be trusted! Who are the people that you believe want the best for you? People that we trust! And when they tell us something that is important for our lives we are willing to check it out for ourselves because of our trust.


We have been on this journey for three weeks and now take a huge step in seizing the opportunities in giving witness to our faith. Are you willing to be an Andrew? We have already learned that we have a personal story and we have shared it with each other. We have learned that we have a personal relationship with Christ, but there is a next step in our process in which we are invited to take. It is sharing our faith story. It is another part of our life story that we cannot get wrong. It is just sharing what our relationship with Christ is like. There is an important discovery that we are all challenged with everyday as a Christ Follower, "our faith is personal, but it is never private" (John Wesley).



In Conclusion:

Today's lesson has a challenge for each of us. Can you share your faith with someone outside this Centershot class? Can you witness to someone each day by doing a kind deed or saying something that reflects the love of God? Can you give a witness to others about Centershot or your Church that would help them to know that you are a Christ Follower?

Each day this week begin by placing 10 pennies in your left pocket. Each time you give witness to your faith, do a kind deed, serve someone else, share in some way that you are a Christ Follower take one penny and place it in your right pocket. - 1. As you begin this session continue to open to each student as you build relationships with them. You may choose to let them reflect over the last few days in their lives and share. Please begin by praying the Lord's Prayer together.
- 2. Perhaps you have a starting line story in your life. Maybe it was your first music recital, your first volleyball game, your first chess match, etc. Discover a starting line point for your group to relate. In addition have some of them share their first athletic, arts, social group, etc. experiences. How did they feel (not think)? Help them to use feeling language. What was it like to shoot a bow for the very first time in Centershot? Investigate the things they thought and felt and relate with them some of your feelings and thoughts as you began teaching these lessons or something else that had a "starting line".

Where is the Starting Line?

Can you run fast? In 2009 Usain Bolt set the world record for the 100 meter dash at 9.58 seconds. He was running 27 mph. In Bolt's native Jamaica he was a standout Cricket player as well as a sprinter. His sprinting career is really unusual because of his size. Usain Bolt is 6'5" tall which hampers him aerodynamically. His maximum power is said to occur when he is less than one second into the race and only running at half his eventual maximum speed. But like all athletes Usain Bolt had to run his very first race. How does he arrive at his greatest power less than one second into the race? Can you image running 27 mph? These were questions Bolt had to answer after long hours of coaching, study, and practice. There was a tremendous amount of practice. With practice comes success and the ability to handle defeat. Have you ever thought about how intimidating the starting line must have been to Usain Bolt the very first time he ran a race?

One of my grandsons loves to wear Michael Jordan athletic shoes. He has never seen Jordan play basketball, but he has heard the many stories from others in the family. Michael Jordan was a great basketball player; renowned in the athletic world, but Michael Jordan had to play his first game, go to his first practice, dawn the court for his first tryout. Have you ever thought about the very first jump ball at half court for Michael Jordan? Both Usain Bolt and Michael Jordan are great examples of people who are physically gifted and live out their greatest potential athletically. But both of these great athletes had their first starting line and first jump ball. We all have a place to begin, a starting line, regardless of what we do.

Last week we discovered that our faith is always personal, but it is never private. In addition we were challenged to begin sharing our faith witness at least ten times every day. How is it going? Where did you start? Share with everyone your starting line! You may want to write your thoughts down in the box.



Know the Word

Read Luke 24:13-35
What does this Scripture mean to you?

We readily tell Good News to anyone who will listen and sometimes we tell it to folks who do not want to listen. Is it good news that you are a follower of Jesus? As we read the Bible and continue to understand that God is in love with each of us regardless, it is great news to know and it is great news to share.

In Luke's Gospel the events around the death of Jesus was terrible news for those who had followed him. It was sad news because someone they loved had died and for some of them the circumstances around Jesus' death brought guilt and shame. The disciples were so afraid for their lives that they had left Jesus when he needed them the most. Peter, Jesus' leader among the disciples had denied Him, not once, but three times. When Jesus hung on the cross only one of His disciples was present, John. After Jesus gave His life on the cross only those who believed they were safe helped to bury His body. Joseph of Armethia and Nicodemus gathered his body and laid it in a tomb that was owned by Joseph. It was a sad day for everyone who followed Jesus.

This man-made Friday, full of desperation and death was the seed God sowed for the redemption of the world. Jesus did not die for nothing. He died for everyone in the world, including you and me! He died to destroy our sin! Because of Jesus' death upon the cross we are forgiven of our sin and made new. There is even more good news! Early on Sunday Morning there were some women who had a solemn task to perform. They were on their way to Jesus' tomb to anoint His body, but they made the discovery of the ages. God is greater than death! The tomb was empty! Because of God's love for us and God's plan to save us from our sins Jesus had died upon the cross and now God raised Jesus from the dead. Because of God's love for us. Jesus had conquered sin, death, and the grave. He lives!

One of the early scenes that revealed the resurrection of Jesus is on the Road to Emmaus. Cleopas, one of the Jesus followers and another follower was walking to Emmaus deep in wonder and questioning everything that had happened since the previous Sunday when Jesus had triumphantly ridden into Jerusalem. The news had come early that morning from others that Jesus' tomb was empty and they did not know whether to believe it or not. They had decided to go home and began walking to Emmaus. Along the way a man met them on the road and began to walk with them. The conversation quickly moved to discussion of the man from Nazareth, but neither of the men recognized the One who walked with them was He. When they arrived at Emmaus the two despondent followers invited the stranger to stay and dine with them. When they sat at table the Risen One took the bread and broke it and the eves of the disciples were opened to the Christ. As the Risen Lord left their presence they proclaimed how their hearts burned within them. Such glorious good news could not be kept quiet. These two followers left immediately and retraced their steps back to Emmaus to tell the other disciples that they had seen Jesus alive. This is the good news that people have been telling for over 2,000 years. It is the news that people all over the world need to hear and they are waiting for people like you and me to tell them about the Risen Jesus.



6 Sixth Arrow Point

Leader Suggestions:

1. Our goal in this lesson is to help everyone understand that the key to witnessing is faithfulness! Begin by reviewing our witnessing journey in the first 5 lessons and then begin with prayer. Perhaps there are students who have given witness to someone and they want the group to pray for them; or they have had a negative encounter and want to offer prayer for all of those involved. As the leader offer your prayer to include these situations

Is this A Journey of Win-Win or Win-Lose?

How are you at losing? How do you handle the word no? When our oldest son was small a day could not pass without some kind of ball game. Usually it was me pitching to him while he attempted to hit the ball with a large plastic bat. He would get so frustrated when I wouldn't hit his bat! Even though I never batted he would always want to know who won. As he grew older, the summer time evenings were filled with kick ball games. Kids from the neighborhood would always know that after dinner they could find a good kick ball game at our house behind the church. Our son grew up to love all kinds of ball games and excelled in baseball, basketball and football in high school. He never liked to lose! Although it is better today, when we play golf he still doesn't like to lose. Who does?

What about this witnessing lifestyle, can you lose at witnessing? Jesus sent out 72 disciples and taught them about losing! When you go to a home that does not accept you, dust your feet off and move on was His instructions (Luke 10:11). Paul, a soldier for Christ found himself in all kinds of situations where he was asked to no longer proclaim the gospel, but his response was that he could not help himself; regardless he was going to share his Jesus story. In Acts 26, Paul is before King Agrippa and shares his witness only to hear the King say, "Almost you have persuaded me", almost, what a sad word from the King's lips.

Jesus also had an experience of hearing no! There was a rich young ruler that Jesus loved that was inquisitive about salvation and asked Jesus,

"Good teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life? You know the commandments: 'You shall not commit adultery, you shall not murder, you shall not steal, you shall not give false testimony, honor your father and mother.' All these I have kept since I was a boy," he said. When Jesus heard this, he said to him, "You still lack one thing. Sell everything you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven. Then come, follow me." When he heard this, he became very sad, because he was very wealthy. (Matthew 19:16-22 selected verses)

Were Paul and Jesus losers at their witnessing ministry? _____ Did their witness of God's transforming love and grace not measure up because a King and a rich young ruler said no?

Our world makes a very big deal out of winning and losing! We make wagers on games; we make threats to coaches of our teams when they disappoint us in losing the big game. A soccer player shoots and kills a referee when the refs' calls seemed unfair. A parent beats another parent to death because of an argument over a hockey game. We are a win-lose society!

One of the questions we must ask ourselves is how will we handle the rejection of our witness of faith? Are we losers when people say no or decide not to spend time with us because they do not want to hear about our relationship with Jesus? When I was teen, our youth group did visitation in our community and invited people to come to church. While making a visit with another youth one evening we had a difficult encounter when we knocked on the door of a home occupied by a widower. He opened the door and we shared that we were from the church two doors down and wanted to invite him to church. He stepped outside his door onto the porch and began to "bless us out" for coming onto his property and asking him such insulting questions. He informed us that he wasn't going to that church or any church because Churches were full of hypocrites and all they wanted was his money and then he told us to get off his property. It was bummer to say the least! We quickly left of course and I felt so rejected and down cast because of his reaction to a simple invitation. Some of the innocence of my faith was destroyed in a few short seconds. In all of my years of ministry and visiting in homes of people I knew and people who were total strangers I never have had that happen again. But as a youth I was done with witnessing to strangers.

Leader Suggestions:

1. Next, we suggest that you play a game where the students will experience winning or losing. Divide the group into 2 teams; let them choose two reps from each team and then let them play corn hole (a game to seven; or let the two teams play bingo and when any one on the team Bingo's that team wins. 2. After the game is over talk with the

teams about their

FEELINGS. What

did it mean for you and your team to

win? What is it like

being on the losing

team? Do you like the emphasis of our society on winners and losers?, etc 3. Another approach may be to have 2 people to role play a witnessing situation where an invitation to attend church is answered with a NO. Make sure in this approach that the one role playing the person extending the invitation does not know that the response will be an infatic NO.

4. After these exercises have concluded read the story of Jesus and the rich young ruler (Matthew 19:16-22) and Paul and King Agrippa (Acts 26:1-29)

Does God expect so many notches on our Bibles? Is success in witnessing how many people are influenced by our witnessing lives and lips? Let me suggest that the winwin in witnessing is faithfulness. In Acts 4:1-20 we read the story of Paul and John before the Sanhedrin, i.e. the supreme court of Judaism. They were forbidden to speak or teach in the name of Jesus again. Their response was not to run and hide, but to proclaim in faithfulness, "...we cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard."

In one of our lessons you were encouraged to share your witness ten times per day and or per week and to acknowledge that by keeping ten pennies in your pocket and every time you shared your witness to move one penny to your other pocket. Have you been successful and/or faithful? That is the question for all of us when it comes to telling of our relationship with Jesus, are we faithful in telling the story.

In Conclusion:

The challenge this week is for us not to measure our lives of witnessing by how many come to church with us or how many times people say yes to our sharing, but how faithful we are sharing the story of God's love and grace that we know in Jesus the Christ. Take the opportunity this week to share your story through serving at a food pantry; feeding the hungry; collecting food for a homeless shelter in your community; sharing in an act of kindness to someone who is elderly in your neighborhood; spending time chatting with someone in a nursing home, etc. and return next week to share your experience. Remember this is a journey of winwin not win-lose! Our faithfulness in giving witness with our lips and our lives is the key! Make it a great week and everyday discover a way to tell His story!

Extra Notes:

Leader Suggestions:

- 1. Take a look at your community situations and help the students develop a plan to serve others in need as a group sometime during the next 2 weeks.
- 2. Close the sharing time with the Lord's Prayer and you might ask ahead of time for one of the students to lead that prayer

Home Alone?

Leader Suggestions:

- 1. As you welcome your group take time to review the journey thus far and particularly last week's lesson. After sharing is completed introduce lesson 7 and begin with prayer.
- 2. Make sure that everyone gets to share. We want each person to feel the loneliness expressed in the individual responses.

If you have watched any of the "Home Alone" flicks and you are like me you have "laughed yourself silly". We all know that the crooks can't be that stupid, but it is hilarious entertainment. It is difficult to believe that a family could leave behind a child, but if you have enough children, perhaps you can. Loneliness! One of the worst illnesses I ever had was homesickness. Being alone is not a choice many of us would make unless under certain circumstances.

Share with the group a time that you felt lonely and how did you overcome it? Use the box below to write your thoughts down.

Perhaps the natural feelings of disappointments and the decision to become discouraged when we are alone is why Jesus sent out the 72 in pairs. Luke shares his witness of this event in chapter 10. Read Chapter 10:1-23 and write your thoughts about this passage in the box on the next page. These disciples, after a crash course in Evangelism 101 were given some OJT (on the job training). They were sent with the specific goal of sharing their witness of the Kingdom of God. Also, they were instructed in what to do in certain situations. They were prepared by Jesus to exercise faithfulness in sowing the seed of the Gospel. Do you remember the parable of the sower? The Gospel of Matthew chapter 13 Jesus shares this powerful parable.

Read Luke 10:1-23
What does this Scripture mean to you?

"That same day Jesus went out of the house and sat by the lake. ² Such large crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat in it, while all the people stood on the shore. 3 Then he told them many things in parables, saying: "A farmer went out to sow his seed. 4 As he was scattering the seed, some fell along the path, and the birds came and ate it up. 5 Some fell on rocky places, where it did not have much soil. It sprang up quickly, because the soil was shallow. ⁶ But when the sun came up, the plants were scorched, and they withered because they had no root. 7 Other seed fell among thorns, which grew up and choked the plants. 8 Still other seed fell on good soil, where it produced a crop—a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown."

This parable is not about the soils but the seed. The farmer sowed (planted) the seed in all of the soils. Again the emphasis is on the faithfulness to sow and to let the seed do its work. What is the seed in this parable?

The seed is the story of God's love and grace that we know in Jesus the Christ. The seed is God's plan of salvation for the whole world and the responsibility and privilege of all disciples is planting it by sharing their witness. Sometimes that witness will be accepted and sometimes it will not, but our joy is to sow it wherever.

One of the real keys to sending out the 72 was their return debriefing. They all gathered together to share their journey. They all had great stories of faithfulness. Reading between the lines of that encounter you can sense that not all of their stories were what we would call fruitful. Some had to have dealt with rejection, disappointment and what they considered failure.

How do we deal with those kinds of emotions as followers of Christ? That question is at the heart of this lesson. Are we in this journey alone? Write your thoughts on this question.

Leader Suggestions:

- 1. The seed is the Gospel, i.e. that God is in love with each of us and has provided God's love and grace for our salvation and reconciliation to God through Jesus Christ.

There was a man in the Early Church whose story is told in the Book of Acts. His name is Barnabas. The name Barnabas means "son of encouragement" and that was exactly what Barnabas did with his life. In all of the accounts of Barnabas' ministry he was encouraging someone. Every disciple needs an encourager! That is one of the reasons why participating in church is so important for us as followers of Christ. The truth is we will all discover times of disappointment, failure, rejection, etc. and we will need someone or a small group in which we can confide and share our hurts and pains.

Jesus planned a share time for the 72 so that everyone could find support and encouragement for their first big mission trip. The interaction between Christ Followers is important for growth, self-disclosure, confidence building, accountability, responsibility, encouragement, etc. As Christ Followers we are a part of something far bigger than ourselves, we are a part of the Kingdom of God. We are not only sent to witness but we are called to be the cheerleaders and encouragers of others who journey with us in the most important calling in life; sharing the story of our relationship with Jesus Christ. May it never be said of us that we left another Follower of Christ "home alone" to deal with life's struggles and joys.

Our challenge this week is to find situations where we can be an encourager. Perhaps we can help a friend to deal with a test failure at school or success in an athletic event; perhaps we can listen to a friend or colleague who is going through a personal event in their life; maybe you know of a person who needs befriending. Perhaps you are struggling with this whole challenge of telling your story of God's love and grace and you need an encourager. This week search for those around you in life's journey that need an "Encourager", let's not leave anyone "home alone".

1. It is important that your group sense the significance of sharing this faith journey with others so that no one is alone or feels alone. 2. Close the session by sharing an event in your life where you experienced the encouragement of another Christ Follower and how it made you feel. Be vulnerable! The group will not be vulnerable without the leader taking those steps as an example. It is in and through our vulnerability that we grow in our faith in Jesus Christ. 3. Leader Suggestions:

1. Reflect with the students over the last week. It would be most helpful for you to offer times that you were encouraged or built up by someone during the last week. After your sharing ask students in the group to share their experiences. After this sharing time begin with prayer. 2. Then read I Timothy 1 for the text today. Note for the students the words of encouragement and challenge that are included in Paul's words to Timothy. This is known as Paul's pastoral letter. After reading the text you can use some of the examples that follow or you can share some of your own stories that reflect leaving tracks. The more personal and vulnerable you are willing to be the more your students will grasp the lesson.

Leaving Tracks

One of the great joys of my life is turkey hunting! I love being in the woods in the early morning hours of a new spring day and listening to the gobbles echoing through the valleys and across the ridges of my native West Virginia. I lack one bird of completing two grandslams (harvesting all 4 species of wild turkey in the United States). It is also awesome fun to do pre-season scouting. Looking for signs of where turkey have been is a great way to determine a strategy for the hunting season; one of those signs that I look for are tracks.

Have you ever thought about the tracks you are leaving for those who follow you? I had the privilege of growing up on a small cattle farm and was taught by my father the personal and public significance of hard work. I remember during the winter months of rising early to help feed the cattle before going to school. Following Dad's tracks in the snow was one of the benefits of being younger. He would blaze the trail for us boys and we would make every attempt to walk in his footsteps. Whether we realize it or not we all are leaving tracks for those who come behind us.

Our youngest son lives in Black Hawk, Colorado. Recently, he called to talk about the cat tracks that he had been seeing close to his house. BIG cat tracks! He also discovered a mule deer carcass close by that was another sign of this big cat. The Department of Natural Resources had been tracking this particular cat for some time through a transponder that had been placed around its neck. The batteries were running low and they needed to capture the cat again and update their monitoring device. It was later that week David called to share that the cat had in fact been captured and that he was able to observe and touch it while it was sedated. Did I mention that it was a BIG cat? Tracks! We all leave tracks! Think of tracks that you may have encountered when you have been in the outdoors. Share the names of the them with the class.

Leader Suggestions:

1. Google "animal" tracks" and gather a large collection of different animal tracks to have your students identify. You may want to divide them into teams and let them discuss and choose their answers together or play a matching game with pictures of the animals and the tracks on the same page so that each student can match the track with the animal, etc. 2. This is an important and insightful time for you as their leader. During the following exercise listen for their choices and the reasons why. Especially be cognoscente of students who are following the tracks of someone that is not a follower of Jesus, and emphasizing how important it is to have a Christian mentor in our life journey.


8 Eighth Arrow Point

Leader Suggestions: 1. Share a personal example of someone who has been a Christian mentor for you. 2. Familiarize yourself with Paul and Timothy and the relationship that they were fostering as Mentor and Mentee. Share the direct instructions that Paul gives to young Timothy as examples of how mentors challenge and encourage their mentees.

When I was in grad school I met a man that changed my life. He was a retiree that was on staff to share with us students what it was like to lead in parish ministry. His name was Bishop Kenneth Goodson. As I write this lesson his portrait hangs on the wall in my office with a yoke hanging over it which is a symbol of the tracks he left for me. He was a mentor for me in the truest of sense! His words, his actions, his life, were all a testimony to a life of faith and devotion to the Christ who we follow. The one statement that he made that I have held onto throughout my life is, "nothing so sets the course of your life, nothing so determines your way then to say, 'this is what I believe'." As a spiritual coach, he gave me strong advice when I needed it and asked me the correct questions that helped me to discover God's directing hand for my life. He left tracks for me to follow that continually lead me to Jesus.

There is a great mentoring example in Scripture, Paul and Timothy. Paul recognizes Timothy's life of faith that Paul had witnessed in Timothy's mother and grandmother and Paul invests his time, energy, love, and resources in equipping Timothy for a ministry of servant leadership.

"I thank God, whom I serve, as my forefathers did, with a clear conscience, as night and day I constantly remember you in my prayers. Recalling your tears, I long to see you, so that I may be filled with joy. I have been reminded of your sincere faith, which first lived in your grandmother Lois and in your mother Eunice and, I am persuaded, now lives in you also. So do not be ashamed to testify about our Lord, or ashamed of me his prisoner. But join with me in suffering for the gospel, by the power of God, who has saved us and called us to a holy life." (II Timothy 1:3-6, 8-9)





Paul left young Timothy tracks as a spiritual mentor to follow as Timothy continued in ministry in the early church. Are you following someone's tracks or leaving tracks for others to follow that will lead them to Jesus? The truth is we all leave tracks of some kind. Are we leaving tracks that when others follow will lead them to Jesus?

As we conclude this witnessing journey we have been challenged to tell our story of faith in Jesus Christ and to include the lifestyle of witness in every aspect of our lives. Today the challenge is that we intentionally work on our relationship with others to identify a Christ follower that can mentor us and in turn we can mentor others who follow behind us. Never forget we all leave tracks! If I follow your tracks will you lead me to Jesus? Take time to think about your tracks you are leaving.







1. This is the last time together so take time to share your joy and growth moments in the journey and allow the students to share what they will take with them from these lessons of sharing their faith. You may choose to close by being in a circle holding hands and praying the Lord's Prayer or as the leader you may want to pray individually for each student in the circle. Make sure that each student knows that you are available for conversation. problems, joys, etc. in the future.
